



The Sacrament of Baptism: Gateway to New Life....

On this third Sunday in Lent, the theme of the readings centres around water, and the links to Baptism are clear. Water is the source of life, but also of destruction. We have the story of the Flood, which brought salvation to Noah and his family, but death to a sinful world; the crossing of the Red Sea, which meant life and liberty to the Israelites, but death to the army of the Pharaoh; and the water from the rock for the Israelites in the desert dryness. We will hear more about these at the Easter Vigil during the blessing of the baptismal water.

This weekend's Gospel is about the Samaritan woman at the well, and it also centres around the theme of water and life. The story begins by Jesus showing Himself as a person in need: tired, hungry and thirsty. She is very surprised at Jesus' approach, but her surprise allows Jesus to turn the tables and offer her 'living water'. At the beginning, she understands Him literally, asks how He can give it as He has no bucket. But the water that Jesus will give is different. Those who drink it will never be thirsty again, and it is eternal life. Again, literally, the woman wants this water that lasts forever. Then she will never have to come to the well again. Jesus connects with the Samaritan woman at the well and gives her the living water. Through this she and the people of the place are able to trust and accept the eternal life he gives them. They recognize Him as the Messiah, the Saviour of the world.

What is this water that Jesus speaks about? It is God's Spirit which comes to us in Baptism and it is the very essence of life. The Sacrament of Baptism is not just a ritual producing magic effects. It is the outward, symbolic sign of a deep reality, the coming of God's spirit into every aspect of a person's life. Baptism gives us new life as adopted children of God. We become partakers of divine life and temples of the Holy Spirit and members of the Church, the Body of Christ. We are now made righteous by God and live in a state of grace, that is, we live in union with God because of His gracious and loving presence.

Let us pray for all those preparing to be baptised at Easter may find that life-enriching faith for their lives.

Second Rite of Reconciliation for Lent - Tuesday March 14th at 6.30pm—We will be offering the Second Rite of Reconciliation this Lent, the sacrament will take place on Tuesday March 14th at 6.30 pm in the St Thomas's Church. This is another great opportunity to gather during Lent as the people of God in an atmosphere of prayer, forgiveness and reconciliation with the God who loves us. Everyone is welcome!





Second of Lent - 11 & 12 March



Priscilla lives in the Hwange district in Zimbabwe with her

husband, Charles, and their two grandsons. Climate change continues to bring unprecedented challenges for people living in the most vulnerable and remote communities in Zimbabwe. With the support of Caritas Hwange, Priscila learnt conservation farming skills to grow drought-resistant crops to support her family during the current food crisis. Priscilla was able to produce a bumper harvest in her first year of practising conservation farming. Priscilla used the funds from her harvest to start poultry farming, which enabled her to sell eggs to pay for her grandchildren's school fees, books and stationery. The poultry farming provides a safety net for Priscilla and her family during times of hardship, like the current drought. While the situation in Zimbabwe and across eastern Africa remains dire, the work of Caritas Hwange means that Priscilla can learn the skills she needs to build resilience and support her family during this current food crisis.


Catechumens – are those non—baptised seeking Baptism and Initiation into the Catholic Church

Readings

3rd Sunday of Lent - Year A

First Reading: (Exodus 17:3-7)

Tormented by thirst, the people complained against Moses. 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt?' they said. 'Was it so that I should die of thirst, my children too, and my cattle?' Moses appealed to the Lord. 'How am I to deal with this people?' he said. 'A little more and they will stone me!' The Lord said to Moses, 'Take with you some of the elders of Israel and move on to the forefront of the people; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the river, and go. I shall be standing before you there on the rock, at Horeb. You must strike the rock, and water will flow from it for the people to drink.' This is what Moses did, in the sight of the elders of Israel. The place was named Massah and Meribah because of the grumbling of the sons of Israel and because they put the Lord to the test by saying, 'Is the Lord with us, or not?'

Responsorial Psalm: (Ps 94:1-2. 6-9)

If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.

Second Reading: (Romans 5:1-2. 5-8)

Through our Lord Jesus Christ by faith we are judged righteous and at peace with God, since it is by faith and through Jesus that we have entered this state of grace in which we can boast about looking forward to God's glory. This hope is not deceptive, because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit which has been given us. We were still helpless when at his appointed moment Christ died for sinful men. It is not easy to die even for a good man – though of course for someone really worthy, a man might be prepared to die – but what proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners.

Gospel Acclamation

Glory to you, Word of God, Lord Jesus Christ! Lord, you are truly the Saviour of the world; give me living water, that I may never thirst again. Glory to you, Word of God, Lord Jesus Christ!

Gospel: (John 4:5-15)

Jesus came to the Samaritan town called Sychar, near the land that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Jacob's well is there and Jesus, tired by the journey, sat straight down by the well. It was about the sixth hour. When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, 'What? You are a Jew and you ask me, a Samaritan, for a drink?' – Jews, in fact, do not associate with Samaritans. Jesus replied:

'If you only knew what God is offering

and who it is that is saying to you:

Give me a drink, you would have been the one to ask,

and he would have given you living water.'

'You have no bucket, sir,' she answered 'and the well is deep: how could you get this living water? Are you a greater man than our father Jacob who gave us this well and drank from it himself with his sons and his cattle?' Jesus replied:

'Whoever drinks this water

will get thirsty again:

but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give

will never be thirsty again:

the water that I shall give

will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life.'

'Sir,' said the woman, 'give me some of that water, so that I may never get thirsty and never have to come here again to draw water. I see you are a prophet, sir. Our fathers worshipped on this mountain, while you say that Jerusalem is the place where one ought to worship.' Jesus said:

'Believe me, woman, the hour is coming

when you will worship the Father

neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem.

You worship what you do not know; we worship what we do know;

for salvation comes from the Jews.

But the hour will come – in fact it is here already –

when true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth:

that is the kind of worshipper the Father wants.

God is spirit, and those who worship must worship in spirit and truth.'

The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah – that is, Christ – is coming; and when he comes he will tell us everything.' 'I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus 'I am he.'

Many Samaritans of that town had believed in him on the strength of the woman's testimony, so, when the Samaritans came up to him, they begged him to stay with them. He stayed for two days, and when he spoke to them many more came to believe; and they said to the woman, 'Now we no longer believe because of what you told us; we have heard him ourselves and we know that he really is the saviour of the world.'
